Crossing from Advent to Christmas

The time from the start of Advent to Christmas is only four weeks but the internal journey of waiting, of “setting our house in order,” of hoping, and finally seeing the Messiah enter our world, which is the fulfillment of God’s promise, seems to take much longer. Each year, the quality of waiting is different. Last year, it seemed the invitation was to persevere because the end of COVID is in sight though still uncertain.

But this year, we are in a different place. We have been vaccinated; some have even received their booster shots. We are a year older and wiser. Perhaps we are beginning to accept that things will never get back to normal. We continue to be cautious and practice all the protocols to protect ourselves and others. But we also know that we cannot continue to put our life on hold.

As we struggle with this dilemma, we step into unmapped territory where there are no landmarks or signposts. It reminds me of the journey of Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem. While they traveled on rough roads, maybe they also had to deal with their own anxieties, fears, and longing. Similarly, we journey inward, wrestling with our own emotions evoked by our own respective contexts. We simply cannot do this alone without God’s help. And thankfully, there are teachings about the meaning of Advent and Christmas to help us find, what Margaret Silf calls, our “inner compass” in this time of uncertainty. Here are some of the teachings and reflections that I’ve found helpful in my own crossing from Advent to Christmas:

1. Advent as Transitions and Invitation to Newness. Fr. Jett Villarin, SJ, in our Maryknoll Class '70 recollection, talked about Advent as transitions, from endings to beginnings,

from oldness to newness. Quoting C.S. Lewis, a renowned spiritual writer, he says, “The great thing, if one can, is to stop regarding all the unpleasant things as interruptions of one’s ‘own’ or ‘real’ life. The truth is of course that what one calls the interruptions are precisely one’s life, the life that God is sending one day by day.” Life is THE great interruption, a great gift.

Fr. Jett goes on to say that we are invited to shift in how we see life: ourselves, God, others. We need to let go of the old clutter of our lives, our securities, and open ourselves to new ways of relating with ourselves, with others and with God. Maybe we are invited to be more attentive to our spouses who may be ailing. Maybe our prayer has become simpler and our petitions for normalcy to return is transformed into an offering or surrender to what life brings. There are also bearings to light our way: sparks of hope and joy, moments of grace, persons who help us in the journey; stories, images and songs that have eased our anxiety.

2. Advent as Waiting with Trust, Coming Home, and Newness. Fr. Ro Atilano, SJ, in another recollection I attended, continues this theme of waiting, the invitation to newness, as well as acknowledging the companions that helped us along the way. He says Advent is waiting, but a waiting that is full of trust that what God promised will be fulfilled. The process of waiting is also a homecoming, “pagbabalik sa piling ng Diyos, ang ating Tahanan.” He made us look at the Holy Family in the first Belen. “Wala silang bahay, pero meron silang tahanan, at may mga tao na dumalaw sa kanila.” So he asked, “If we are to draw our own Belen, sinu-sino ang mga taong nakasama natin?” He also asks, “Ano ang nagbago sa iyo?” “Paano ka binago?” “Paano mo gustong pasalamatang and mga taong tumulong sa iyo? (na naging kasama sa Belen ninyo?)”



3. Christmas as the Triumph of Good Over Evil. As we approach Christmas, Fr. Ro reminds us of this important fact, that Christ has entered our world and has conquered evil. As Maria Ressa said in her speech accepting the Nobel Peace Prize, there are many bad people in the world, but there are also many good people in the world. But the battle (yes, it is a battle) continues. To paraphrase what Fr. Jett said, in the same recollection, “It takes a lot of love to stave off the ‘nothingness’” which I take to mean the chaos before God put order into the world and inserted the second person of the Trinity into history.

So we are in the midst of the nine-day Simbang Gabi. Christmas is almost upon us. Reflecting on some of the points I cited, we may ask ourselves, “Ano ang nagbago sa aking sarili? Sa aking pananaw? Sa pagtingin ko sa aking minamahal? Sa Diyos? Sa bayan? Sa pagpili ng mamumuno sa atin? If all we

can say is, “Wala naman, ok lang, business as usual,” then perhaps we have missed opportunities to really see our life and our world with new eyes.

But if we can say any of these: “This pandemic has given me greater trust in God because I know now with conviction that I belong to Him and He takes care of His own.” “Now I can see that I need to take better care of my spouse!” “People say I am kinder!” “I can live simply pala!” “I shall continue the good I am doing.” And if we are able to acknowledge the “people, the graced moments, the sparks of joy” that helped us in our journey to Bethlehem, then perhaps we can have our homecoming with God on Christmas Day, ready to show Him our Belen, our Tahanan filled with love, peace, and joy. Happy Christmas everyone!

Cancer Warrior in the Palm of His Hand

t all started with Typhoon Ulysses...

After cleaning the house, I had a severe case of amoebiasis. I really felt awful. I had to deal with stomach pain and multiple trips to the bathroom while making sure the house is clean and put back into order.

I had a teleconsultation on 1 December 2020 and was immediately treated for my amoebiasis. But the pain and bloody stool persisted so I went to a gastroenterologist on 29 December 2020. I had a CT scan, an MRI, and a colonoscopy. On 29 January 2021, I was finally diagnosed with sigmoid colon cancer Stage 3B. I had surgery on 2 February 2021 to remove the fist-sized tumor and started chemotherapy on 24 March 2021.

Initially, I was in shock. I never expected that this could happen to me. I had this feeling that I was immortal. I thought to myself that I was too young and strong to have cancer. After the shock, the next emotion I felt was fear. If I died, what would happen to my family? My kids are still young; how would they continue their studies? And if I survive, how much would my medical bills be? I felt depressed afterwards. Parang ang pakiramdam ko nuon, kakatapos lang ng isang matinding krus (baha), may panibago na naman. But you know, this was really the time that God spoke to me. After praying the Jesus prayer over and over (Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me, a sinner), I was given the consolation that God will take care of

everything. Parang God said "Ako ang bahala." On top of that, a lot of people were praying for me and praying WITH me. My family and friends were there to support me, and, surprisingly, even people I did not know. I did not expect to receive financial support which greatly helped us with our medical expenses. We were very touched when Magis Deo included us as one of the beneficiaries of the Valentine online concert.

Despite what I was going through, with the pain and side effects of chemotherapy, this was the time I was closest to God. I felt I was in the palm of His hand. My days were filled with prayer and meditation, which helped me mentally and emotionally in dealing with this difficult situation. Alam niyo, nakatulong talaga sa akin yung mga prayer meetings with Matthew BCGG. I did not feel alone in this journey. Ramdam na ramdam ko ang pagmamahal at aruga; that there were people in my corner, rooting for me to get well.

After 10 months of rigorous treatment which included two surgeries, twelve cycles of chemotherapy, and countless other medical procedures, I am looking forward to having a PET scan and colonoscopy to determine my current state, including another surgery before the year ends.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all who have been with me during this journey. I have felt God's love through all of you.

Accompanying the Shepherds Series

Understanding Psychological Issues Affecting the Sheep III – Other Psychopathologies in Marriage and Family

In addition to mood disorders, personality, character style and other disorders, shepherds may encounter other psychopathologies in the marriage and family life of their lambs that would affect the latter's psychospiritual state of being. These were discussed in the last session of the three-part series: "Understanding Psychological Issues Affecting the Sheep" on November 6, 2021, by Fr. James Gascon, SJ. One hundred five members from 22 BCGGs attended the session.

The objective of learning about psychological issues affecting our sheep is to enable us to understand and share ways of caring for sheep who have mental or psychological illnesses. Our mission to care for our lambs cannot be overemphasized. It is critical to remember that it is not the person but the mental or psychological illness that is our foe.

To summarize, these psychological issues would include:

Developmental/Social Disorders resulting from insufficient or improper development especially in childhood that could be due to genetics or environmental influences, among many other causes.

Examples:

1. ADHD or Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder characterized by difficulty paying attention or controlling impulsive behaviors (acting without thinking of the consequences) or being overly active.

2. ADS or Autism Spectrum Disorder which refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech, and non-verbal communication.

3. Cerebral Palsy, a group of disorders that affect a person's ability to move and maintain balance as well as posture.

4. Asperger's Syndrome, a neurodevelopmental disorder characterized by significant difficulties in social interaction and nonverbal communication, along with restricted and repetitive patterns of behavior and interests.

5. Intellectual Disability.

6. Learning Disability.

Cognitive Disorder. A deficiency in one's capacity to use intellectual acumen like thinking, listening, learning, understanding, justifying, questioning, and paying close attention.

1. Alzheimer's Disease, a progressive neurological condition in which the death of brain cells causes memory loss and cognitive decline.

2. Frontotemporal Dementia, a variant of brain degeneration characterized by progressive atrophy (cell loss) in frontal and anterior temporal regions of the brain leading to alterations in complex thinking, personality, and behavior.

3. Corticobasal Degeneration, another variant that can cause gradually worsening problems with movement, speech, memory, and swallowing.

4. Huntington's Disease, an inherited condition that stops parts of the brain from working properly over time.

5. Lewy Body Dementia, the second most common type of progressive dementia after Alzheimer's Disease. Protein deposits called Lewy bodies develop in nerve cells in the brain regions involved in thinking, memory, and movement or motor control.

6. Mild Cognitive Impairment, an early stage of memory loss or other cognitive ability loss such as lingual or visual/spatial perception in individuals who nonetheless maintain the ability to independently perform most activities of daily living.

7. Primary Progressive Aphasia, a neurological syndrome in which language capabilities are slowly and progressively impaired.

8. Progressive Supranuclear Palsy, an uncommon brain disorder that causes serious problems with walking, balance, and eye movements, and eventually with swallowing. This disorder results from the deterioration of cells in the areas of the brain that control body movement, coordination, thinking, and other essential functions.

Sleep Disorders characterized by difficulty in sleeping, experiencing either over or lack of sleep.

Examples:

1. RLS or Restless Leg Syndrome, a condition that causes one's legs to move or shake because of an unpleasant sensation.

2. RBD or REM Sleep Behavior Disorder or Dream-Enacting Behavior in which one physically acts out vivid, often unpleasant dreams with vocal sounds and sudden, often violent arm and leg movements during REM sleep.

3. Sleep Apnea, a potentially serious disorder characterized by one's breathing repeatedly stopping and restarting.

4. Narcolepsy, a chronic sleep disorder characterized by overwhelming daytime drowsiness and sudden attacks of sleep, difficulty staying awake for long periods of time regardless of the circumstances. This can cause serious disruption of one's daily routine.

Substance Use Disorder, a disease that affects a person's brain and behavior, leading to an inability to control the use of legal or illegal drugs or medications.

Examples:

1. Nicotine Use Disorder
2. Stimulant Use Disorder
3. Sedative Use Disorder
4. Hallucinogen Use Disorder
5. Alcohol Use Disorder

Schizophrenia and Psychosis, the disengagement from reality commonly referred to as "baliw." While symptoms vary dramatically in pattern and severity from person to person, these include hallucinations, disorganized speech and behavior, the so-called "negative" symptoms like lack of social interaction, communication, or motivations.

Somatization or Somatoform, a psychological illness experienced as physical symptoms. When mental factors such as stress cause physical symptoms, the condition is known as somatization. A severe form of somatization where physical symptoms cause great, often long-term distress is called a somatoform disorder.

Examples:

1. Hypochondriasis


Christmas Cheer for Olandes Suyuan

“ Being a student and teenager attending online classes during the pandemic is not easy but there are also good things that happened. 

Like Mary and Joseph, all I have to do is to humbly obey, surrender, and serve.
